

Record Is Dean of County Papers

Was Started in 1868, Or May Be Dated to 1858 By **One Story**

The Berrien County Record, dean of Berrien county publications by the margin of a year any way you can ligure it, has another birthday this coming week, as it completes its 67th year with this issue.

Founded in 1867 according to the accepted version, it predates by several months the next oldest publications, the Benton Harhor News-Palladium, which saw the light some time in 1868. The only other papers in Berrien county eligible to membership in The American Press Half-Century club are the Berrien Springs Journal-Era, started in 1875 and

the Niles Star, started in 1886. According to a list of Michigan papers eligible for membership in the above hypothetical association which was recently published in "The American Press," the Record is one of 43 weeklies in the state founded before 1870. However, if the version of the Edward Ellis h.story of Berrien county, published in 1880, be accepted, then the Record is the lineal descendant of the Buchanan Vindicator, established in 1858. There seems to be a little discrepancy in Ellis' account of the founder of "The Vindicator," since the name of the founder is given one place as J. M. Patton and in another place as J. M. Potter. Alonzo Bennett moved a printing press to Buchanan about 1860 and other versions credit him with being the founder of the first paper here.
