Would Elect Commissioners From Precincts, Mayor at Large

To Elect Mayor

Petitions were filed with City Clerk Harry Post yesterday which automatically place before the electors of the city of Buchcanan at the spring polls April 5, a referendum for a change in the city charter, a chief feature of which would be the selection of the mayor, clerk and treasurer by election instead of by the present methods.

The mayor is at present elected as a commissioner and selected at an organization meeting of the commissioners themselves. The proposed amendment provides that a mayor be elected from the city at large in 1938 to hold office for two years, and who must be a resident of the city for at least two years preceding his election. The same year one commissioner at large should be elected for a

term of two years. In the spring polls of 1939 another commissioner at large should be elected, for one year. In 1940 two commissioners should be one in each precinct having the highest number of votes holding for two years and the next highest for one year.





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
