George Richards Taken by Death

Retired Funeral Director Dies After Long Illness

Last rites were held for George B. Richards, 77, from the Hamilton Funeral Home at 2 p. m. Friday and interment was made in a mausoleum in Highland cemetery, South Bend, Ind. The following account of his life was written for the Record by Mrs. Ab Glover: George Burge Richards was born November 18th, 1859 in Buchanan, Berrien County, Michigan, where most of his life was passed. He was the fifth child and first son of Alfred and Laura (Martin) Richards pioneer residents and for many years a prominent and highly esteemed family in Buchanan. January 30th, 1879 George B. Richards and Clara May, daughter of Jesse J. and Ann Maria (Whitman) Roe were married at the home of her parents in Buchanan. To them was given one child, Robert Roe Richards, now of Mt. Vernon, New York. George B. Richards remembered his Creator in the days of his youth, and was baptized during the most successful revival meeting ever held in Buchanan, conducted by the lamented evangelist Knowles Shaw, during the winter of 1875-76. By the people, Mr. Richards was called to serve the public in various positions of trust such as Township supervisor, assessor, member of the school board for twelve years and later a member of the cemetery board, and he was always interested in the welfare and prosperity of his home town. He was a life member of Buchanan Lodge No. 68 F. & A. M. For twenty years he served as undertaker, a business for which he was exceptionally and admirably fitted and universally liked. He was the last of his father's family to cross the Great Divide, and since the departure of his wife, Feb. 16th, 1935, in his sad loneliness and prolonged illness, he many times has heard precious voices from the further shore tenderly calling in musical tones "Dear! Beloved! O Why Longer Room?" March 31st, 1937 the dark waters rolled over him and he joined those gone before to their long home "in the land of dreams." He leaves his son, Robert Roe Richards; two grand children, George Burge Richards of Oakland, California and Helen of Mt. Vernon, New York; one niece, Marjorie Terriere of Taylorville, Illinois and one nephew, Fred Eaton of Toledo, Ohio and many friends and acquaintances.

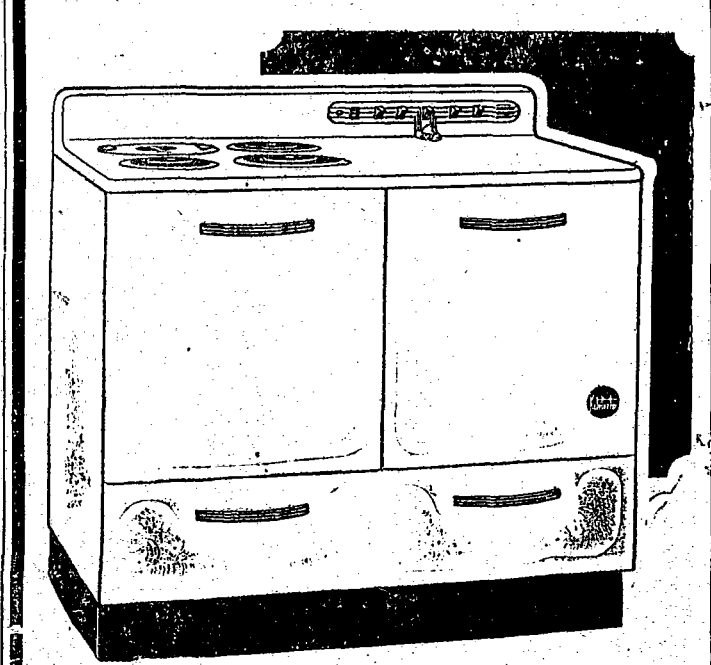

Through the courtesy of Mrs. Lillian Hunter the Record has received a clipping from the Caribou Observer (British Columbia) telling of the mail carrying record of her brother, Willard Broceus.  
Broceus has a four year contract to carry the mail by team on a 150 mile route once a month north from the end of the railway at Quesnel. He has been carrying the mail between 7 and 8 years. He left Buchanan at the age of 23 and is now 60. He is the father of Mrs. John Russell. The Caribou article follows:  
**The Mail Goes Through**  
Bill Broceus found the going tough on his last trip with the PUNCHAW Lake mail. He pulled out of Bouche Lake Sunday morning with four horses, but even with the extra team he was a day late in making Blackwater.  
The road is broken to Goose Lake, where a number of Bouche Lake ranchers have hay meadows, but from that point on snow covers the ground to a depth of thirty inches.  
At Goose Lake Broceus changes to a ski-runner conveyance which rides on top of the snow. Bill had the sled made purposely for the Goose Lake section, where the snow attains great depth, and where there is very little travel. In fact, with the exception of the mail, very few travel over this stretch of road in the winter months.  
But it takes more than deep snow to stop the PUNCHAW mail carrier; he always gets through. Five years ago high water took out the bridge across the Blackwater, and Bill, with the aid of Jim Withrow, the Yukon operator, rigged up a telegraph wire cable, on which was slung a bosun's chair. With the mail bags strapped to his back, Bill pulled himself across.  
Very few of those who have fallen into the Blackwater at this point, where the water rushes at a furious pace through a narrow rock-walled canyon have come out alive. But it did not deter Bill.

### HIGH SCHOOL NEWS
