Buchanan, according to a man who travels western and entral Michigan in a business connection and who is very well liftormed, is one of a half dozen cities in his territory which is known to be definitely expanding industrially at the

Among other cities with a similar current expansion re Muskegon, Kalamazoo, Holland, and Sturgis. This means that each of these cities is either acquiring a new ndustry or that one or more of its established industries is xpanding its operations.

In the case of Muskegon, the Norge company is moving as Detroit plant to the former lumbering capital on the west oast. The Bennett Pumps company, which had moved its lant away, is moving back. The Continental Motors plant, nactive in part for a time, is now expanding in the manuacture of parts for other automotive concerns.

At Kalamazoo the paper industry is definitely expanding nd Kalamazoo is a "paper" city. Also the Humphrey con-ern, manufacturer of water heaters, is moving back from ittsburgh. Upjohns, maker of pharmaceutical supplies, is
