Michigan today is chijoying really remarkable values in telephone service.

The Company's material and labor costs have increased sifbstantially since reductions in rates were made in 1984, 1935 and 1936. In 1934 rates for service to farmers and for long distance service were reduced; in 1935 the long distance night rate was niade effective at 7 o'clock every night and was extended to all day every Sunday; in 1936 further reductions were made in the rates for long distance and for various other services and items of equipment, and the charges for installing and moving telephones were drastically cut.
