in which case it must redeem the buildings at a fair price. The lease can be transmitted at death to heirs, it can be sold and it is good as collateral. In fact it seems to have about all the advantages and lacks some of the disadvantage of ownership. The leaseholder pays annually a lease price amounting

The basement of the houses must year serves as interest charge on the valuation and it also pays for all the cost of laving out the suburb and for all street improvement including paving, sidewalks, water, gas and sewer mains and extensive landscaping. All these are paid for in cne regular annual charge determined on when the

lot is bought. The ownership never threatened by the imposition of large improvement assessments. The Swede knows where he is at when he starts.
