A siren is to be installed at the pavilion, and in the event of a fire, the alarm will be turned in there, and every home owner will go to the immediate aid. A call will be placed with the Buchanan fire department at the same time.

Under the terms of the Use Tax Act all tangible personal property purchased for use , consumption or storage in Michigan is subject to a three per cent tax, regardless of where it was purchased. The Act is designed to eliminate taxfree, out-of-state competition and place retailers in other states on an equal competitive basis with Michigan merchants, who must pay a sales tax on their


