John Skovera is Interested in Headlines from Czechoslovakia

Follows Trade of Shoemaker in Flight from Europe 3 Mos. Before World War

There is an interested watcher of the headlines on the European situation these days and that is John Skovera, genial shoemaker on Front street, who but for a twist of fate might be pushing the daisies in a soldier's grave somewhere in middle Europe now, or if not that he would be one of the reservists between 6 and 60 called to the colors by the premier of Czechoslovakia.

It was in April, 1914, that Skovera boarded a ship at Hamburg, bound for America. That was only three months before Hell broke loose in Europe. Had the war been declared before he started he would have had no chance to escape. His twin brother was killed fighting on the Russian front.

Soon afterward he went back but in three days a bullet with his number on it came his way. Coming back to John Skovera, it took him about two years to get out of Europe. He had learned the shoemaker's trade and had followed it for three years in the beautiful city of Budapest in Hungary and can speak both languages.

He was enrolled for military service in Austria-Hungary, but he wanted to come to America. He left Budapest and went to Vienna. There one day he was at the depot talking to a crowd of Hungarians, Serbians and Slovaks, all bound for America. The police noticed him, took him to police headquarters for questioning. What was he doing? He was just in Vienna on his way to Prague, Bohemia, he said, to find work.

That spudded all right to the police, but just to make sure that he went to Prague, they took some of his money, bought him a ticket to Prague and placed him on the train. After working at Prague for a while he drifted on north, intent on getting to the German frontier and stealing across. Two gendarmes stopped him and questioned him. He said a shoemaker in Prague had told him that there was a chance to get work in Moldau, another Bohemian city nearer the frontier so they let him go. Arriving at Moldau he staid there a while and then went to another town immediately on the German frontier. Then one evening he stole across, making the passage in an isolated hilly section. He was not molested, and did not actually know when he crossed the frontier. But after a while he stopped at a farmhouse where there was an old mill with a water wheel, grinding grain. They could speak only German, which he could not understand. But they took him in and fed him well and he went on.

In a factor town near the border he got his Austrian money changed and went on to Berlin. After a few days there he went on to Hamburg, the sea port town. There he got a good position, and was about to amass enough money to leave for America when he had a stroke of bad luck—he lost 400 crowns at cards. Eager to go on, he wrote to a sister in Chicago, trying to borrow money, but no answer came and after eight months he left Hamburg for a little town in Westphalia on the French frontier.

After he had worked there a while, a letter came with a steamship ticket to America and a train ticket to Chicago. So he left immediately, on April 1914, just three months before fate in the form of the world war bore down on Europe, killed his twin brother and 10,000,000 others.

HOME OWNING PROSPECTS Ownership of what might be called a modern home is not within reach of the man of average or even better-than-average income...

This is in part due to the inadequacy of income but quite as much to maladjustment in the building industry. Says Fortune:

Society is burdened with an archaic system of housing and a large number of men and dollars are consequently unemployed. And the average man, who spends from 20 to 25% of his income on the rent or purchase of a dwelling, receives in turn incomparably less, dollar for dollar, than from other any major expenditure he makes.

William S. Knudsen, president of General Motors, believes that the technical people of the country can do something to make better housing available for the working man.

Everybody in industry is interested in helping promote research to see if a house cannot be produced for less money," he said recently. "A man can pay six or seven hundred dollars for a motor car, but when he steps up to a house it will cost anywhere from three to six thousand dollars. I am sure that the technicians can do something to improve housing conditions for the working man—he certainly deserves it.

It is my experience that the majority of workmen strive for home, family and country, with no desire to be anything but cooperative in the betterment of those three things.
