Name WPA Observer for Sewage Plant

Fred E. Laffrey, Keego Harbor,
Oakland county, arrived in Bu-
chanan Thursday to act as official
engineer and observer for the Pub-
lic Works Administration in the
construction of the sewage dis-
posal plant here.

He relieved H. L. Fuller, who is
in general charge of several con-
struction plants in this district. It
will be the duty of Laffrey to
check every item of construction
with a view to representing the
public interest. He will have no
direct authority, except that any
grounded complaint made by him
might cause the Public Works Ad-
ministration to suspend payments
until the matter was righted. He
will be required to see to it that
the labor is selected and employ-
ed in conformance with the de-
partment's requirements.

The contractor must get all of
his labor from the state employ-
ment service, located at Niles.
The men must come from Buchanan
as far as possible. While the a.m.
of the employment must be to re-
duce the relief roles as far as
possible, labor need not all be
drawn from those on relief. All of
the men will be subject to dis-
charge if they do not prove suit-
able workmen. Common labor is to
be paid not less than 45 cents an
hour for a 40 hour week. Laffrey
estimated that in the neighborhood
of 75% of the work would be per-
formed by common labor, the re-
maining requiring skilled and
semi-skilled labor. The labor must
not work over eight hours any one
day or over 40 hours in any one
week.

Washburn Talks to State Vegetable Assoc. Convention

D. L. Boardman returned Wed-
nesday morning from a trip to
Detroit. While there he attend-
ed several sessions of the National
Vegetable Growers Convention
being held in Detroit this week.

Speakers from several states
gave interesting addresses on
mass growing of various vegeta-
bles, one of the finest being given
by Kermit Washburn, presi-
dent of the Michigan State As-
sociation, on asparagus growing
and marketing. He also gave the
address of welcome.

Mr. Washburn was instructor
of agriculture in the Buchanan
schools for two years. He has a
large acreage of asparagus and
fruits on his farms at Decatur
and Paw Paw.

Move Old Turbine To Pioneer Mill

The old turbine which was taken
from the site of the Bainton mill
last week will enter another period
of usefulness on another pioneer
power site, according to Messrs.
Harry Preston of Hartland, Wil-
liam L. Salmon, Jr., of Fenton and
Roy Parshall of Hartland, who
lifted the old wheel from its set-
ting in the mill ruins and moved
it to Parshallville, Mich., last
week.

The turbine is to be installed on
the old Parshallville dam near the
mill which has done service there
80 years. It will not be used for
powering the mill, however, but
for providing light and heat for
the home of the mill owner,
Thomas Walker, who may also sell
domestic electricity to several
neighbors. Roy Parshall, who
moved the mill, is a relative of
the Isaac Parshall who founded
the town and established the mill.

Local Church Endows Memorial Chapel to Founders on Fox River, Ill.

Historic Advent Christian Sect Gives Receipts of Sale Parsonage to Ill. Camp Ground

The Advent Christian church,
most historic of all Buchanan's
religious organizations, closed the
books on its local properties recent-
ly by signing over title to its for-
mer parsonage at South Oak street,
to a camp meeting organization of
the same church, the receipts from
its disposal to go to the erection
of a church there as a memorial
to the charter members of the
local organization.

The actual transfer consisted in
signing a \$1200 sale contract to
the property to the Illinois camp
meeting ground organization. This
is three miles north of St. Charles,
Ill., on a beautiful location on the
Fox river. The Advent Christian
churches of Illinois acquired 15
acres here for \$10,000 three years
ago and have been developing it
as a summer church camp. To
date they have had no church
building and have held their only
summer religious meetings in a
tent.

The \$1200 given by the Buchan-
an society will erect a log struc-
ture 36x75 feet in dimension, and
partly furnish it. Construction
within this financial limit will be
made possible from the fact that
the camp meeting organization has
contracted for sufficient logs of
uniform size on the ground at a
Wisconsin lumber camp for \$100.
Members of the church in the Chi-
cago area who own trucks will
haul them free to the chapel site.
The building will be erected in
rough style suited to summer
camp use, but there will be a large
fire place in one end for cooler
weather. It is estimated that the
structure will seat about 500.

A bronze plate will be mounted
on the structure with the names
of the thirteen charter members
of the old Advent Christian church
of Buchanan, the same organiza-
tion which split off from the
Larger Hope church at the corner
of Moccasin and Third street and
erected in 1887 a large structure
of their own, now the quarters of
the Bristol Pattern Works on
South Oak street. The records of
the old church have been lost but
the daughter of a communicant
gave the following names from
memory: Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Grif-
fin, Mr. and Mrs. Philander Weav-
er, Mr. and Mrs. Sanford Smith,
Mrs. Phidella Slater, Mr. and Mrs.
Robert Mead, Mr. and Mrs. John
Alliger, Mrs. Julius Russell.

The "Larger Hope" church from
which the Advent Christian church
divided was one of the branches of
the historically famous "Millerite"
sect, which was very strong in the
middle of the 19th century. The
split occurred when the majority
of the organization developed
leanings toward the "New Age"
cult, which was Universalist in
creed. The Advent Christians or
Millerites who split off conceived
themselves to be the true contin-
uation of the Millerite organization,
but since they were outnumbered
by the "New Age" leavers, the
thirteen objectors formed an or-
ganization of their own. But, al-
though they were few in number
they were strong in determina-
tion and ability. Within a short
time they had set about the con-
struction of the much larger
church structure on South Oak
street. In the development of their
church they were aided by the
leadership of Rev. Mansfield and
his wife, and the church became
not only the largest and strongest
in Buchanan during the late sixties
and early seventies, but also a
center of the faith through the
Middle West.

Here was established the west-
ern publication house of the Miller-
ites, the eastern house being lo-
cated at Boston, Mass. In a three
story building located back of the
old church was printed their west-
ern publication, "The Light of Ad-
vent Christian books and tracts."
To Buchanan in those days came
many of the national sectarian
leaders of the Advent Christian
and similar faiths. The large struc-
ture on Oak street was jammed to
the doors with communicants and
with interested attendants.

But that has passed. The church
that rocked with song in the
seventies and was a spiritual
center of the community now
turns out industrial rather than
spiritual patterns. The bell that
once called its communicants to
the service of the Lord now rings
for a similar purpose in faraway
Canton, China. The later and
smaller church on North Oak
street is now the property of the
L. D. S. organization. Now the
parsonage is gone and the only
physical evidence remaining will
soon be the log chapel on the Fox
river with the brass plate carry-
ing the names of the thirteen
dissenters who set out in 1887 on
a spiritual emigration as deter-
mined as that of the Pilgrims,
from the corner of Third and
Moccasin to 125 South Oak.

Willis Delibac of this city, died at
his home at 1336 Phoenix street,
Niles, on Monday of last week
after an illness of six years.

He was born at St. Anne, Ill.
He lived three years in Buchanan
during which time he was em-
ployed at the Clark Equipment
company. He then moved to Niles,
where he worked at the Kanner
plant for eight years. For several
years he had been incapacitated by
illness.

He is survived by his widow,
Mrs. May Delibac; by three chil-
dren, Willis Delibac of Buchanan,
Walter Delibac who now lives at
the parental home in Niles, and
Mrs. Edna Salisbury, also of Niles;
by two grandchildren.

Former Resident Dies in South Bend

half brother, James H. Scott, 85,
at 2 p. m. Thursday in the Indiana
Avenue Christian church.

Mr. Scott was a native of Port-
age Prairie and for a number of
years a resident and business man
of Buchanan. His father, George
Scott, owned and operated a farm
on the South Bend road just across
the line in Indiana, and directly
across the road on the South Bend
road from the old Miles homestead.
James H. Scott was born and
reared there. His father moved to
Buchanan when he was young and
entered the boot and shoe busi-
ness. The son, James H. Scott,
entered the grocery business and
continued here for a number of
years. He left Buchanan at the age
of 41 and moved to South Bend,
where he had lived since. He died
Aug. 21 at the home of his son,
Homer Scott, at 1204 East Indiana
Avenue after an illness of a year
with a heart ailment. In addition
to the son referred to he is sur-
vived by a grandson and a great
grandson. Burial was made in
Highland cemetery, South Bend.

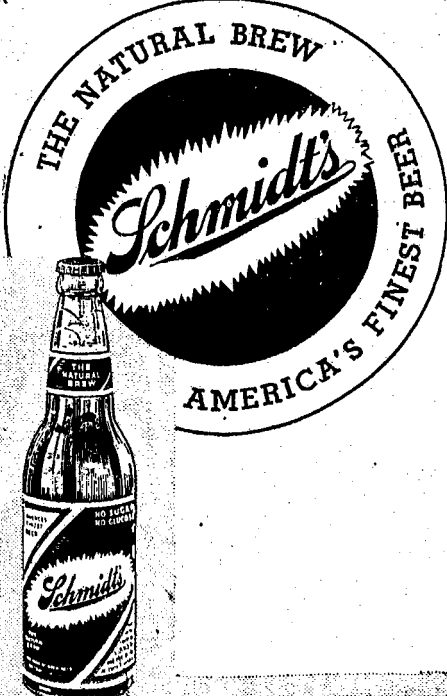

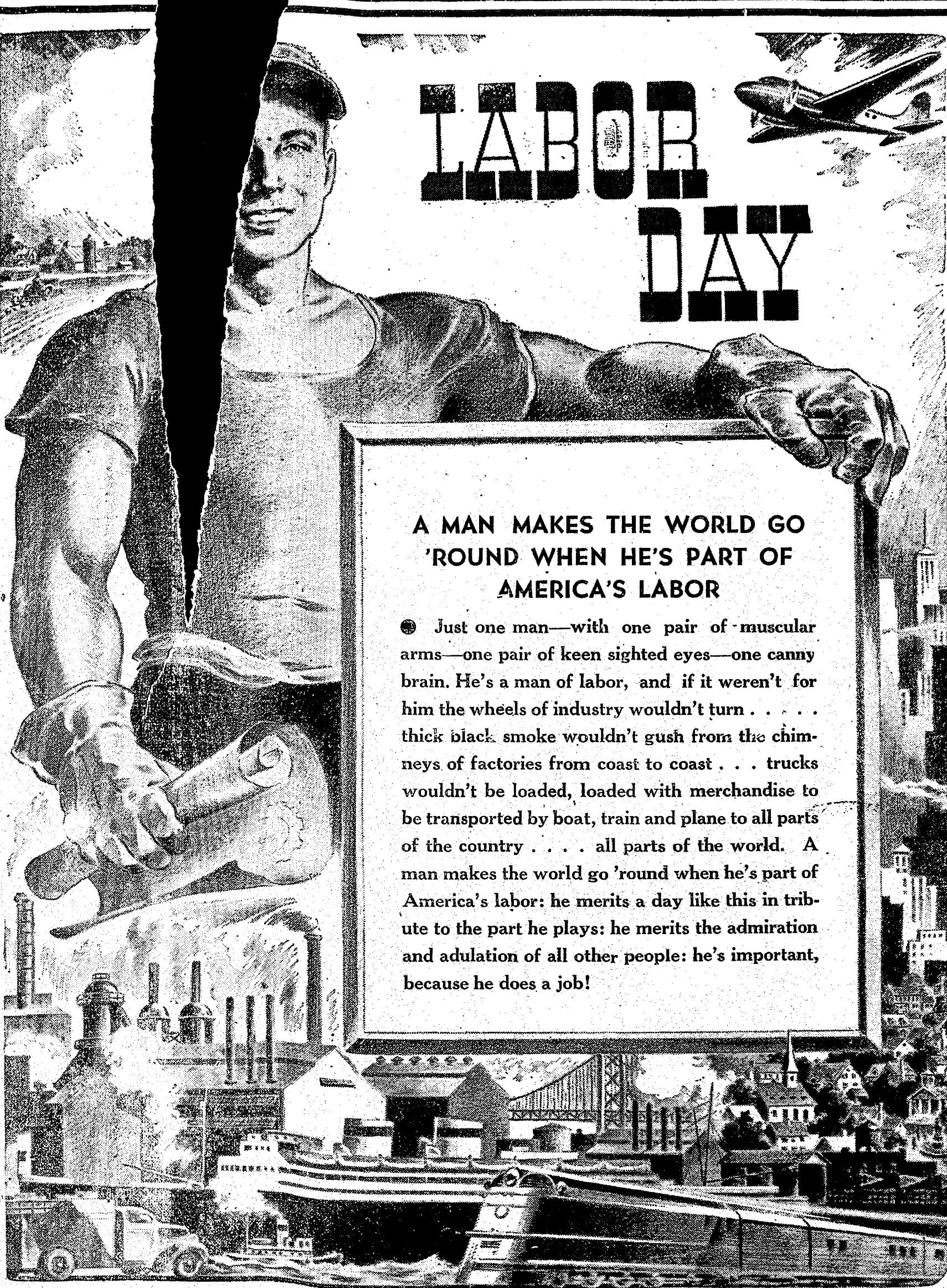
