A Famous Editorial The following editorial appeared in the New York Sun Sept. 21, 1897, its author a well known editorial writer of that day, Francis P. Church.

It has been reprinted innumerable times since, but usually just prior to Christmas. Preceding the text of the editorial below is the story of how it was written, as told by Edward P. Mitchell, who was then in charge of the editorial page during the last illness of the editor-in-chief, Charles D. Dana:

"One day in 1897 I handed to him a letter that had come in the mail from a child of eight saying: please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?' Her little friends had told her no. Church bristled and pooh-poohed at the subject when I suggested that he write a reply to Virginia O'Hanlon; but he took the letter and turned with an air of resignation to his desk. In a short time he had produced the article which has probably been reprinted during the past quarter of a century, as the classic expression of Christmas sentiment, more millions of times than any other dewspaper article ever written by any newspaper writer in any language. Even yet no holiday season approaches without bringing to the hewspaper requests from all over the land for the exact text for repeated use on Christmas Day."

The article originally appeared on Sept. 21, 1897, but the author's identity was not made public unil April 12, 1906, the day after Mr. Church's death.

"DEAR EDITOR-I am 8 years

Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.


