

Plant Operator Concert League to Present Templeton

Commission Votes to Leave Selection to Chicago Pump Company

17 Apply for Job

The city commission received for consideration the names of 17 applicants for the position of operator and caretaker of the new sewage disposal plant at their special meeting Tuesday evening. it was voted that the matter of selection be left to a representative of the Chicago Pump Co., who will come to confer with the applicants. Geo.ge Hicks and T. Shoebotham of the Chicago Pump Co., came out last week to instruct the operator, but returned

when they found that he had not been selected. They will return when the plant is finally opened and will be here about a month. The machinery was given a demonsulation test here Thursday afternoon when the sewage was turned through, in the presence of city officials, of City Engineer Charles W. Cole and -of Col. Edward Rich, representative of the state health department. Col. Rich stated that the plant is one of the most complete and most attractive in the state and represents the latest development in sewage disposal.

Net Debt of City I o Be \$76,000

City Commission Retires Last \$15,000 of Waterworks Bonds Series of Good Friday and Easter Services at

\$55,000 Indebtedness Incurred by Construction of Sewage Pinnt and Sewers

The city of Buchanan now wns the city waterworks entire after 46 years of indebtedness, during which the interest paid more than equalled the cost of the plant.

The city commission voted to rethe remaining \$15,000 in waterworks bunus at the special neeting held Monday evening. The bonds are due _pril 15. 'the total indebieuness of the city is now \$91,550, leaving a net of \$76,550 after the water bonds are paid. Of this net amount, \$35,000 was incurred by the construction of the new sewage plant and \$20,000 by the added sewerage of the past year.







• HOW ABOUT THE DUST ON THE REDBUD TRAIL? There are other things than prophets that are not without honor save in their own countries.

Recently a newspaper in a neighboring city instituted some inquiries as to when the redbud trees would be in bloom on the Redbud trail, and what measures, if any, would be taken to allay the dust nuisance at that time.

The representative of the paper stated that there was gave her report. much interest manifested in the Trail as a suitable drive during the spring, but that last year dust had been so heavy that it not only obscured any view of the route but also made driving difficult.

As a publicity feature the Redbud Trail is, or could be made, a fine asset to Buchanan. It has actually been that -for several years, but its usefulness could be multiplied by the expenditure of only a moderate amount of energy and a bery much smaller outlay in funds. It could be made the lever for getting a paved north and south route through the city.

If it be indeed an asset, as business organizations be-00 lieve, merely to have people pass through Buchanan it would serve that end; by publicizing a beautiful scenic asset in the neighborhood of the city it would have an indirect but real influence on the value of real estate, especially for those buyers who interested in summer or suburban homes or places for retirement.

The ideal organization to promote the Trail would be a Civic garden club, such as several cities in this vicinity already have.
