Denies Rights As **Exclusive Agent**

Sustains Layoff 15 Men; Rules Against Layoff of 1 Employe

Ruling that the Clark Equipment company did not improperly discriminate against the American Federation of Labor in refusing to deal with it as an exclusive bargaining agent for the company employes at Battle Creek, the National Labor Relations Board reversed an intermediate report of last year, according to notice received by the Buchanan offices of the company Saturday.

The National Lapor Relations Board concurred with the three other main points of the intermediate report of 1938, which upheld the action of the company in layng off 15 employes, and ruled against its action in laying off one employe on another count, and also ruled that the company had not sufficiently collaborated with the American Federation of Labor unit in organization.

Since the reversal, of the internediate report by federal arbitrer Wenzel in 1938, in its ruling on the right of American Federation of Labor Lodge No. 48 to represent Battle Creek employes of the Clark Equipment exclusively was considered a main point at issue, the decision of the board terminates this matter satisfactorily to the local company.







. (Continued from Page One) Bend, was the Goddess of Liberty. .The story written by Homer

Hathaway for the Record follows: In 1864 Lincoln ran for president again and 1 was living in Buchanan on the lot now owned by T. Tourge on the corner of Oak and Third street.

I will relate how during that campaign the city of Niles and the village of Buchanan joined forces and worked together.

Senator Howard of Michigan was to speak in South Bend about Oct. 20. and Berrien county was to furnish a large delegation, the larger the better. The Niles delegation was to cross the river at Niles, come west to the Gitchell house then south to the Dutch grocery, then on to the corners east of Amos place, where they would meet the Buchanan delegation. To do our part Buchanan appointed two committees to make the arrangements for Buchanan. I remember the name of the committee named to get together a delegation of young ladies to represent each state and provide conveyance for them, also to look after them from start to finish. They were Harvey Roe, James Wood and Homer Hathaway. The committee met and divided the work thus. Mr. Roe and Mr.






