Of 13 Years Wins Championship of America in big spelling contest

Cleveland, Ohio, June 30 - With 1560 chances to err. 15 of the eighth grade school children of Cleveland yesterday misspelled only 40 words in the big intercity spelling contest which opened the annual convention of the National Educational association, and this city won the contest from Pittsburg, New Orleans and Erie, Pa., each of which cities sent a team of 15 to the convention.

The victory was a personal triumph for a little dusky maiden, Marie G. Bolden, 13 years old, daughter of a ne gro mail carrier of this city, who spelled every word correctly both in oral and written tests. The convention was swept with a storm of applause at her demonstration, the result of which was made known far down the line of announcements on the big blackboards, and at a time when her score meant a victory for Cleveland, the earlier announcements having put Pittsburg and New Orleans in the lead.
