BERRIEN COUNTY RECORD AND ARGUS CONSOLIDATE

Thomas J. Tormey, Able Newspaper Man, Purchases Papers. P. A. Graffort Remains with Consolidation and Assumes Management of Job Department.

A deal has been consummated with in the past few days whereby T. Tormey, for many years city editor of the Niles Daily Star, has purchased the Berrien County Record, edited by R. J. Burch. At the same time, Mr. Tormey assumes the ownership of the Buchanan Argus. The two papers will be consolidated under the new management. With this issue, Mr. Graffort, who for the past eight years has published the Argus, lays aside the responsibilities as editor, but will remain with the consolidation, assuming the supervision of the job department.

The retiring editor wishes to express to the merchants of Buchanan and public in general his most hearty thanks for the liberal patronage which has been given him during the period of his ownership and thus have assisted in making the Argus one of the best advertising mediums in the county. 

SUES FOR HEAVY DAMAGES

Frank Corey, of Niles, De mands Damages for Injuries Sustained at Paper Mills.

Frank Corey, a former employe the French Paper company of Niles, Monday morning started suit in the circuit court for permanent injuries which he alleges to have received while in the employ of the company on August 7, 1906, more han three years ago.

Negligence on the pert of the defendant company in neglecting to place lights in a shed in which he was working, is the ground on which the suit is based and which is responsible for him being reduced to a hopeless cripple for the remainder of his days

According to Corey's declaration he is paralyzed from the best down, thereby rendering him a hopeless and permanent cripple

Corey states that it was his work to load bales of paper pulp onto tram car and push the same into the factory. The bales were loaded in an outside shed, which was not light
