





Your number was drawn in the draft lottery last Friday, Mr. Registered Man, because the number of every registered man was pulled, and the higher your number in the drawing the better your chance of not be- form for filing this claim is simple. ing called in the first draft.

Each man if he was registered, will receive a card in a few days commanding him to present himself before the board for examination. That will be in Dr. Robert Henderson's office in Niles.

According to the plan which will he followed in the examination which will begin soon, the first 520 men drawn in the south part of the county will be summoned to Dr. Henderson's office. These men will be examined for the purpose of getting 258, southern Berrien county, the quota which the government requires for this district. In case the 258 men cannot be obtained in the first 520 drawn, the second 520 will be called upon and so on until the quota for this district has been filled out. The higher your number the less your chance for being called on the first draft.

Here are some things you should

You must report for physical examination on the day named in your call.

(a) If you are found physieally disqualified the board will give you a certificate which will explain to you what your further duties are.

(b) If you are found physically qualified and file a claim for exemption within 7 days after your call you will be given 10 days after filing your claim of exemption to file proof in support of your claim of exemption. See (VII) below.

(c) If you are found physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or if you do not appear for physical examination, your name will be posted to the dis rict board as one who was called for military service and was not exempted or discharged. On the eighth day after call, or within two days thereafter, copies of the list of persons so posted to the district boards will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in a place at the office of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to you at the address on your reg-


