Finding the civil service unable to supply the increasing demand of governmental agencies for trained stenographers, typists and clerks, the woman's committee of the defense council has undertaken to enroll for such service the many women of trained minds throughout the country.

Debate on the \$27,000,000 rivers and harbors bill in the senate yesterday developed vigorous protests that the measure is not an emergency war proposal and should not be considered at this time. The leaders plan, however, to keep it before the senate until it is disposed of or displaced by war revenue legislation. Senator Kenyon attacked the bill as a remnant of a dribbling and wasteful appropriation plan.

Because he had joined the army the judge gave him a suspended sentence.

Between this city and South Bend, almost in South Bend, there is a huge pile of coal being stored. It has attracted considerable attention because it is piled in the open along side the Michigan Central right of way. A. E. Saum, the local dealer, is doing the same thing along the Big Four tracks in the vicinity of the depot in this city. All of his bins are full and the big loads of coal are being dumped along side of the tracks. Mr. Saum has over 700 tons piled in the open and is receiving cars daily and is getting ready for the winter business. Other dealers are also stocking up and most of them have their bins filled to capacity with soft coal in anticipation of the threatened famine the coming winter.

Magistrate Marsh in the Yorkville Court, New York city, decided yesterday it was not criminal for one to leave his home and wife if he did so to join the armed forces of the country. Sherman James Hager, twenty eight, of 173 South Division street, Buffalo, was arraigned before the magistrate on the charge of wife desertion. When he announced that he left home to join the marines, and that he intended to support his wife out of his \$30 a month the magistrate discharged him with the wish that he soon might become a corporal.

Four men leave the Niles recruiting station this evening for Grand Rapids. Holmes E. Marble, a Buchanan man, enlisted this noon. William J. Baker of the village was rejected at the examination, and his friend who desired to accompany him on the trip to the front, got cold feet and backed down, when Baker was turned down. Tony Fingre, an Austrian, also a resident of Buchanan, begged Recruiting Officer Utendorfer to take him on. He passed the physical test all right, but when the officer wired to Captain Boice at Grand Rapids regarding the enlistment, he was informed he could not take a man from an enemy country. Fingre had his first papers and registration card, but that did not cut a bit of figure, he was turned down because Austria, like Germany, is at war with the United States.

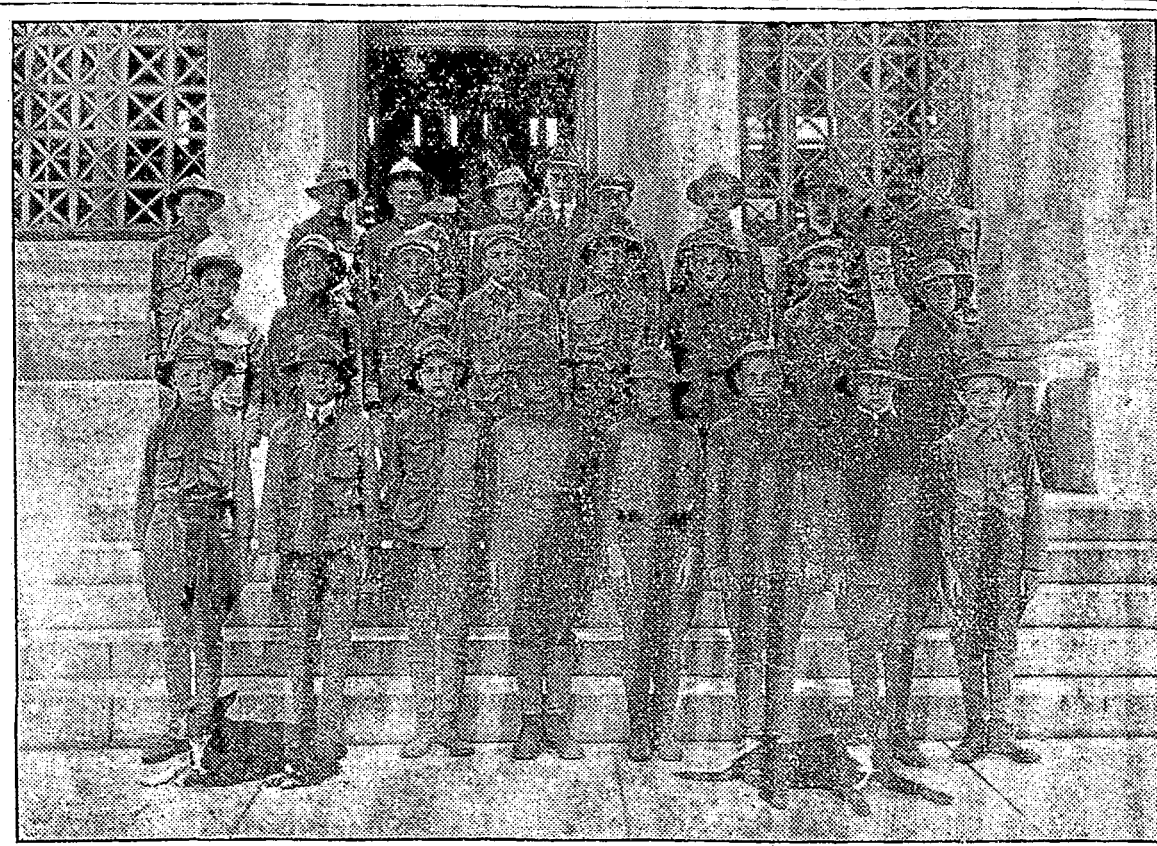
